THE DIGIT PROJECT

Summary

Teens use digital media to explore and experiment with intimacy and their gender identities, develop interpersonal relationships and community connections and access identity-specific resources and services from the relative safety of anonymity. The aim of this project is to analyse how Italian teens (re)define their understanding of gender and intimacy by engaging with digital media and incorporating it into their daily lives.

Main Objectives

The project has 3 main objectives:

1. Producing an important contribution to the field of gender and media studies in terms of knowledge about digital media, young people, gender identities and intimacy;
2. Promoting relevant transformative cultural changes by providing accessible instruments to educators and policymakers;
3. Promoting teens' critical literacy and gender awareness, helping them to better understand and question the logic of platforms and digital media.

To address these goals, after a systematic literature review, a multilevel mixed-methods approach was implemented across four main phases of research activities involving teens aged 16-18 from different Italian regions.

Research activities

The main research activities were as follows:

1. Focus groups employed visual design methods to explore the field;
2. Face-to-face semi-structured interviews were used to explore the relationship between digital practices, gender and intimacy in teens' everyday lives;
3. A national survey was used to generalise the qualitative results; and
4. Final dissemination.

The methodological rationale entails the creation and coordination of a Young Researchers Group (YRG) that comprises youths aged 16-18 with different gender identities and sexual orientations. The YRG supports the entire research project by participating in the co-construction of the instruments for the empirical work and in the design of formative events and communicative artefacts for young people.

The results are disseminated, step by step, throughout the entire project, with both 'traditional' and innovative dissemination tools that are used to address different audiences.

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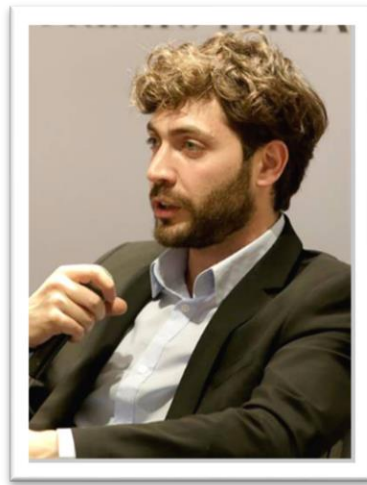


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Principal Investigator



Cosimo Marco Scarcelli, PhD, is an Associate Professor in the Department of Philosophy, Sociology, Education and Applied Psychology (FISPPA) at the University of Padua.

He teaches Media, Gender and Sexuality and Digital Intimacies. Furthermore, he is a member of the Social Sciences doctoral programme board.

He is the Chair of the Bachelor's degree programme in Communication.

His research interests focus on digital cultures in relation to sexuality, intimacy, gender, love and emotions, masculinities, and pornographies.

He is involved in numerous national and international research groups and has published scientific essays, including the books: "Young People and the Smartphone" (Palgrave, 2022, with P. Magaudda and M. Drusian), "Intimità digitali" (FrancoAngeli, 2015), "Sociologia dei New Media" (UTET 2018, with R. Stella, C. Riva and M. Drusian), and "Gender and sexuality in the European media" (Routledge 2021, edited with Despina Chronaki, Sara De Vuyst, and Sergio Villanueva Baselga). His publications include numerous articles and book chapters in both national and international contexts. Additionally, he has served as Associate Editor for Wiley's Encyclopaedia of Gender, Media & Communication.

He is one of the editors of the Journal of Gender Studies (Taylor and Francis) and the Digital Intimacies book series by Bloomsbury. He is also a member of the scientific and editorial boards of several international and national journals and book series.

He has been chair of the Gender & Communication section of ECREA (European Communication Research and Education Association) from 2018-2021, after serving as vice-chair of the same section for the periods 2015-2016 and 2016-2018.

In addition to his academic work, he is involved in various training programmes for public and private institutions on topics related to young people's use of digital technologies.

ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

Aims & Topics

The digital space is gradually contributing to shaping the concept of intimacy, transforming what was once considered the exclusive domain of the private sphere into a continuous flow of data, desires, and connections. From social media to dating apps, from digital tools for self-expression to algorithmic imaginaries, intimate relationships are constantly redefined in the digital environment in increasingly complex and multifaceted ways. For young people, digital media has become an essential part of their everyday lives, as they are the fastest group in taking up, transforming and abandoning new technologies. In their daily media practices, young people establish, maintain, and perform relationships while negotiating the need for privacy with the desire for visibility. Digital platforms act as affective architectures, creating new marketplaces where emotions, identities, and relationships are continuously profiled and monetized.

As Laurent Berlant (1998) noted, these “contradictory desires” are intrinsic to the intimacy of daily life. By welcoming the ambiguities and paradoxes of intimacy, connection and identity, the field of digital intimacies contends with the constant interplay between public and private in everyday life. How is intimacy experienced in a context where everything seems mediated through algorithms and regimes of visibility? What new forms of affection, sexuality, and bonds emerge in the digital daily lives of young people, and what risks do these transformations entail? How do young people draw on, negotiate and transform representations and models of intimate relationships?

This conference invites researchers to investigate the multiple ways in which young people interact with, negotiate, and reinvent intimacy in a progressively digitalized world. Intimacy is not limited to romantic or sexual relationships, but includes a broader spectrum of dimensions, such as friendships, family bonds, personal identity, and emotional well-being. We welcome approaches that move beyond and challenge heteronormative, Western-centric notions of intimacy, inviting broader and more inclusive conceptualizations.

The goal of the conference is to create a critical discussion space to reflect on the opportunities, challenges, and contradictions inherent in digital intimacies, exploring its intersections with the social, cultural, and technological dimensions of daily life. While the digital offers new possibilities for connections, self-expression, and identity construction, it simultaneously raises questions about privacy, surveillance, commodification, and inequalities

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Jessica Ringrose



Professor Jessica Ringrose (she/her) PhD (York University Canada) is co-Director of the Centre for Sociology of Education and Equity at IOE UCL's Faculty of Education and Society, London UK. She also is the cofounder of Postdigital Intimacies research network. Prof Ringrose is an internationally recognized and widely cited expert on teens and social media, youth activism, young people's gender and sexual cultures, sex education and digital literacy in school settings. She had been privileged to collaborate on these topics with colleagues in Canada, USA, Australia, New Zealand, Sweden, Denmark, Ireland, Chile, The Netherlands and more. She has also worked with a wide range of global and UK stakeholders to shape policy and practice in areas of education, gender, media and communications and justice, and her research recently informed the Online Safety Act, UK. Her recent projects focus on developing educational interventions to prevent tech facilitated gender based and sexual violence, online misogyny and transphobia. In 2020 she was the recipient of The American Educational Research Association (AERA) Distinguished Contributions to Gender Equity in Education Award. She co-authored *Digital Feminist Activism: Women and Girls Fight Back against Rape Culture* (OUP, 2019). Her latest book, *Teens, Social Media and Image Based Abuse* is out in 2025 with Palgrave.

Paul Byron (University of Technology Sydney) researches young people's digital cultures of care and informal support, including LGBTQ+ young people's peer-based mental health support on social media. He is co-chair of Australian chapter of the International Partnership for Queer Youth Resilience (INQYR), and author of the book, *Digital Media, Friendship and Cultures of Care* (Routledge, 2021). He is currently researching TikTok cultures of queer and trans mental health support.
